



## Ohio Garden Club Tackles Invasive Species

Recently, The Gates Mills Land Conservancy in the Village of Gates Mills, Ohio acquired a 41-acre tract of old neglected farmland overgrown with thorny brush. Along with a conservancy easement of 51 acres of virgin forest and wetlands, the aim was to make it a sanctuary for native rare species, flora, birds, bees, and butterflies, as well as to provide educational opportunities for the community. The Sherman Road Preserve has open grasslands, 44 acres of hardwood forest and a primary headwater stream that flows directly into an Ohio Scenic River.

The enormous interest in obtaining this property was fueled by the rare wildlife identified on the land. Three species of significance have been found on the property: Bobolink, a grassland nesting bird species that is a state species of concern; a very uncommon ground beetle (*Pterostichus atratus*); and the northern two-lined salamander, which serves as an indicator species of high-quality headwater habitat. The northern dusky and the eastern red-backed salamander species were also discovered on the property. This combination of habitats also helps to sustain a migrating bird population, providing them places to rest and feed.

In collaboration with the GM Land Conservancy, Gates Mills Garden Club has labored in the physical removal of the invasive species that have overtaken this Preserve (including glossy buckthorn, multiflora roses, knotweed, and barberry) to uncover many native species including maples, cherries, dogwood, and Viburnum.

Throughout 2021, armed with loppers and clippers, Gates Mills Garden Club members gathered with other volunteers and cleared over 2 ½ acres of these invasive species. Because of this back-breaking work, a beautiful meadow has begun to appear.

Along with the removal of these invasives, the Garden Club has initiated a project to encourage the establishment of native plants in the meadow. Club members harvested seeds and propagated hundreds of Milkweed plants which were planted last fall. The cultivation of Milkweed and other native plants will provide food and nectar for Monarch butterflies and other pollinators.

**Container and Indoor Gardening  
Ten Containers thru the Seasons**

With spring here, the honey bees are gearing up for their essential role in the earth's ecosystem. Watching a honeybee perched atop a flower gathering nectar and pollen, have you ever given much thought to the essential role the insect plays in the delicate balance of the earth's ecosystem? When a bee pollinates a plant, it's the first step in building a thriving ecosystem that supports all life on earth. What role can you play to "Bee" better?

1. **Plant a bee garden with bee friendly flowers and herbs.** By planting a bee garden, you can create a habitat corridor with plants that are rich in pollen and nectar.
2. **Go chemical-free for bees.** Synthetic pesticides, fertilizers and herbicides are harmful to bees. Instead, opt for natural organic products.
3. **Create a bee bath.** Bees work up quite a thirst foraging and collecting nectar. Fill a shallow bird bath or bowl with clean water and stones-a perfect spot for a long, refreshing drink.
4. **Provide trees for bees.** Bees get most of their nectar from trees. When a tree blooms, it provides hundreds-if not thousands of blossoms to feed from. Trees are not only a great food source for bees, but also an essential habitat.

**What is EARTHJUSTICE and What Does it Do?**

EARTHJUSTICE is a charitable environmental watchdog group that uses the power of the law to preserve our magnificent places such as Arizona’s San Pedro River, the last free-flowing river in the desert southwest, wildlife such as Sea Turtles, Whales, Gray Wolves, to protect people’s health such as improving the Mercury and Air Toxics Rule, stopping heavy air pollution and reforming industrial agriculture, advance clean energy and combat climate change. Earthjustice keeps the pressure on the FDA, the Environmental Protection Agency and the Department of Agriculture to listen to the concerns of consumers, sustainable farmers, scientists and health professionals. They have worked at reducing harmful pesticides, eliminating toxic chemicals from our food processing and packaging, encouraged sustainable farming methods and promoted a healthy environment. Children are the most vulnerable, pound for pound. They drink 2 ½ times more water, eat 3-4 times more food and breathe 2 times more air. They absorb a higher concentration of pesticides than adults. Earthjustice has had success working to reduce harmful pesticide-use. Researchers have accumulated much evidence linking the massive honeybee die-off to “systemic” insecticides like neonicotinoids. Honey bees which are dying in record numbers are vital pollinators of more than 1/3 of our nation’s crops such as berries, nuts and avocados. They are in trouble around the world which has been named “colony-collapse-disorder (CCD)”. The deadly pesticide paraquat, currently banned in 32 countries remains one of the most widely used herbicides in the United States. Continued EPA-sanctioned use of paraquat leaves communities and farmworkers exposed to unreasonable risks. In 2 huge victories for bees, the courts ruled in Earthjustice’s favor. Unfortunately, the EPA announced in 2019 it would allow unrestricted use of the bee-killing pesticide sulfoxaflor once again. Because the earth needs a good lawyer, that is why Earthjustice exists. They are the first and largest nonprofit environmental law organization in the country.


